

 residents.


Population Growth, 2010-2018



2010-2017

Majority of the growth (83%) occurred in 7-county metro

- MN grew by 274,000 in 7 years
- Hennepin and Ramsey added 135,00 jointly




This decade and next: Unprecedented increases in MN's 65+ population

Number of additional older adults, age 65+ (thousands)





Change in older adults, age 65+ (in thousands)





Population by age and sex Minnesota, 2015






Minnesota's labor force growth is projected to slow further over the next 10 years


Migration fuels the growth of Minnesota's labor force





But what about automation?


Automation is technically feasible for many types of activities in industry sectors, but some activities can be more affected than others.




Populations of Color now jointly total more than 1 million in MN, 20% of the population








Full-Time Employment with Higher Earnings (> \$35,000) Grew for Workers in all Major Race Groups. continued







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


Unemployment gaps have narrowed, large differences remain in the share participating in the labor force


The gap in high school graduation narrowed and then stabilized again

Minnesota's Educational Attainment Goal: 70% of adults will have a Certificate or Higher by 2025


Figure 1. Minnesota's Estimated Population Age 25 to 44 with a Certificate or Higher Credential, by Basic Race and Ethnicity Categories, 2011-2015




The Economic Status of Minnesotans 2018

Takeaways: What does it all mean?

- Employers have on-going pressures to address their labor needs in new ways
- Market forces are not going to bring together an increasingly unequal income distribution—in fact they may even speed up the growth of incomes at the lower end of the distribution
- Students and prospective students have more opportunities and sometimes incentives to spend their time working
- Educators have an on role to play to match people's skills **quickly** with employers; to train for jobs near the middle of the income distribution
